

REPORT OF THE FIRST (1ST) ORDINARY GENERAL ASSEMBLY MEETING OF THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FOURTH ASSEMBLY MEETING OF THE ATWIMA MPONUA DISTRICT ASSEMBLY HELD ON THURSDAY, 30TH APRIL 2026 AT THE ASSEMBLY HALL, NYINAHIN

The Atwima Mponua District Assembly held its First Ordinary General Assembly Meeting on Thursday, 30th April 2026, during which a number of issues relevant to the development of the District were deliberated upon. The meeting also addressed key highlights from the District Chief Executive's address, as well as decisions and resolutions reached for consideration and necessary action.

The meeting was attended by the Presiding Member, the District Chief Executive, the District Coordinating Director, all Assembly Members, members of the District Security Council, Heads of Department and Institutions, the media and general staff.

1. SECURITY SITUATION IN THE DISTRICT

The Security situation in the District remains generally calm and peaceful despite the recent robbery attack. There has been a recent armed robbery at Nkrumah/Betinko Highway, Sreso Timpon and Ahyiresu especially the attack on footballers along the Ahyiresu-Kwame Dwuma Sreso road. This made the District Security Council (DISEC) in collaboration with the Police anti-robbery taskforce apprehended two of the armed robbers and in police custody for further investigations. The Ghana Immigration Service had also carried a routine checks at the various hotels to flash out illegal ECOWAS nationals in the district.

2. FINANCES OF THE ASSEMBLY

Financial resources remain essential to the effective functioning of the Assembly, as they support the implementation of development programmes and activities. In line with this, Management has prioritized revenue mobilization as a key responsibility.

To enhance revenue generation, the Assembly implemented strategic measure by inaugurating the Area Councils in the district to generate revenue for the Assembly.

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During the first quarter of 2026, the Assembly mobilized a total of GH¢**412,503.31.00**, representing **89%** of the budgeted target of GH¢**459,038.00** as compared to the same period in 2025, where **GH¢240,904.60** was mobilized, this reflect an increase of **GH¢ 171,598.71**, representing a **58.40%** growth in the Internally Generated Fund.

The Assembly received a total of GH¢15,486,719.00 out of the budgeted GH¢**21,376,873.48**, representing approximately 72% of the expected DACF for the year. The funds received played a crucial role in supporting the implementation of key development projects and programmes in the District.

ALLOWANCE FOR HON. ASSEMBLY MEMBERS

Government has paid monthly allowances to Hon. Assembly Members up to December 2025 in recognition of their contributions to local development.

The Assembly had maintained the payment of sitting allowances of GH¢250.00 and Transport and Travelling (T&T) allowances GH¢100 bringing a total allowances to GH¢ 350.00 per member for every General Assembly Meeting.

This was to motivate Hon. Members to effectively perform their roles and responsibilities in support of community development.

3. EDUCATION

As efforts are on-going to ensure that quality education becomes accessible to all children in the District, the Directorate was able to organize a one- day Inter- Schools Reading Festival for both lower and upper primary schools. The inter-circuit soccer Under 13 primary boys' competition was also organized for thirteen basic schools of

7. ROADS

Under the big push programme, the Assembly was able to asphalt some of the roads within the district to enhance economic activities. Some of the selected roads reshaped in the district are listed below;

which Akorabourkrom D/A Primary proceeded to represent the district at the zonal competition. During the 69th Independence Day Celebration, several awards were given to the deserving teachers in the District through the ISMAT FOUNDATION. Awards were categorized in the following;

1. Teachers in Hard To-Reach Communities
2. Long Service Category – 15 years above
3. Teachers in Administration
4. Other Consolation Prizes

The Assembly has been able to procure a total of **95bags** of cement and **8packets** roofing sheets to support some schools in the district.

4. AGRICULTURE

The District Chief Executive expressed his appreciation to all stakeholders for their participation in the 41st Farmer's Day Celebration held at Banielkrom.

He also reported that, the implementation of Feed Ghana Programme has been substantial progress and over 7,300 farmers were been trained on mitigation and adaptation practices. The District received Nine Thousand, Six Hundred and Seventy – Four birds through the Nkoko Nketenkete programme. He added that Agriculture inputs such as 10,000 coconut seedlings, 400bags of Urea, 350bags of NPK, 50boxes of weedicides, all from the Ministry of Local Government, Chieftaincy and Religious Affairs and 40boxes of wellington boots from the Regional Coordinating Council.

and access to services at health post, CHPS Compounds, health centers and polyclinics will only require the presentation of the Ghana card.

10. SOCIAL SECTOR

Members were informed that during the first quarter of 2026, the Department of Social Welfare and Community Development registered a total of fourteen (14) persons with disabilities (PWD's) comprising of ten (10) males and four (4) females which captured various categories of disabilities, including physical disabilities, hearing and speech impairments, visual impairments and intellectual impairments.

In relation to economic empowerment initiatives, thirteen (13) deep freezers were distributed to support selected PWDs beneficiaries, comprising of eight (8) females and five (5) males through the disability fund.

LIVELIHOOD EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMME (LEAP)

Members were notified that **818** LEAP beneficiaries household were sensitized during the 99th and 100th payment cycles respectively, focusing on effective utilization of LEAP grants, promotion of health living practices, renewal of National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS) membership and the importance of regular school attendance for children.

The Assembly successfully supervised the disbursement of funds during both payment cycles where Seven hundred and thirty-one (731) households benefited, with total amount of Six Hundred and Seventy Thousand, Six Hundred and Forty Ghana cedis (GH¢670,640.00) disbursed.

A sensitization programme on One Hundred and Twenty (120) PWDs across twenty-three (23) communities within the district was conducted.

The department in collaboration with the National Health Insurance Scheme (NHIS) Unit renewed expired NHIS cards for a total of seven thousand, four hundred and forty-two (7,442) indigents and school feeding pupils across forty-six (46) communities in the district within the period under review to improve healthcare services among the vulnerable populations.

8. SANITATION

The Hon. DCE notified members on the sanitation situation in the district and mentioned that the Environmental health unit for the first quarter, 2026 carried out the following activities.

- Evacuation of refuse dump at Nyinahin Anloga Zongo, Nyinahin Salem.
- Procurement of 5No. Communal refuse containers by the Assembly to be placed at designated refuse sites.
- Desilting of choked gutters in Nyinahin.

Members were also made aware that the Government has terminated the contract of sweepers with Zoomlion and has directed MMDA's to take over the management of sanitation personnel and the Assembly has been given the mandates to recruit sanitation workers to ensure effective supervision.

With that, the Assembly has planned to engage about 25 personnel based on available funds.

9. HEALTH ISSUES

Members were notified that, the district, for the first quarter of the year, recorded zero maternal and a decrease in neo-natal death rate and was able to achieve 100% coverage of children receiving routine vitamin A supplement.

The Hon. DCE briefed members on HIV and AIDS wide-spreading in the district, with most new infections occurring within the **15-49** age group.

Members were informed that **337** patients are currently on treatment, **96** new infections with **112** people in the district not attending the hospital for treatment or has stopped taking the antiretroviral drugs.

Members were informed that the President on **April, 15th, 2026**, launched the free primary health care initiative at Dodowa in the Shai Osudoku District, Greater Accra Region where every Ghanaian would be entitled to one basic health screening annually

April, 2026 at the Assembly's conference room and approved the following decisions (recommendations) to be implemented by management.
